Villegas, Aidan VandenElzen, Leah O'Connell, Emily Asselin, and Isabella Bays attended a camp hosted by the Rotary Club of Holland, "Leaders of the 21st Century." Rotary International is ۵ worldwide nonprofit organization that focuses on service to others. The camp was held on Hope College's campus and the students were there for two days, staying the night in a Hope College campus dorm. At the camp, students learned about Rotary International and their motto "Service Above Self." This motto means that we should put someone's needs in front of our own, by leading them in service. Students at the camp developed important leadership skills, met students from other schools, and learned about Rotary and their mission. On May 3, the six students who participated in the Rotary Camp over the summer were invited together with Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Supple, the principal and academic dean of Corpus Christi, to meet with Rotarians (Members of a

## Chess Club

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



# **Corpus Christi Foundation**



The Corpus Christi Foundation awarded their annual gift to Corpus Christi Catholic School in January.
