

8th Grade Sacrament of Confirmation By Isabella Bays

To start off, I would like to say what an honor it is to make your Confirmation. During this Sacrament, you receive the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, you become an adult of the Catholic Church, and it is the last Sacrament of Initiation. That is what is so amazing about being in a Catholic-Christian environment; you can practice your faith and everyone helps prepare you for the sacrament. Especially being the 8th graders' last year at Corpus Christi, this was a very special time for us, being able to share our joy of the Sacrament with one another.

Some of you may be wondering, what is Confirmation? Well I can tell you, from just being Confirmed myself, it is a very powerful sacrament. As I had said before, we



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receive the Gifts of the Holy Spirit, become a full adult of the Catholic Church, and it is the last Sacrament of Initiation (which completes the Initiation into the Church). The grace given to us in Baptism is renewed, confirmed, and made strong in Confirmation. As well, in Baptism, we are anointed with Sacred Chrism, which dates back to the Old Testament. This is why Jesus gives us a mission to baptize all nations in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. In a way, we kind of have our own personal Pentecost. Like when the Holy Spirit came to the Apostles to give them strength and speak in different tongues, God is asking us to do the same.



Some of the students had learned so much through this experience, and some are still learning. Elaina Dishinger, an 8th grader, said, "It showed that we are all welcomed into the church and gave me a deeper understanding of our faith." Another 8th Grader, Leah O'Connell, said "God is active in my life today through all my friends and family that I am blessed to see every day." Our Lady of the Lake Church candidates had already made their Confirmation, but St. Francis will make theirs this upcoming Fall. Samantha Rangel, also an 8th grader who attends St. Francis, said, "What I hope to get out of Confirmation is growing in my faith and having a stronger relationship with God." As you can see, all of these 8th graders, whether they have made their Confirmation or are going to make their Confirmation, can all learn how important it is to have a faith filled relationship through the Sacrament.

Our in-class experience also had a lot to do with us getting ready for the Sacrament. During our Religion class, one to two times a week, we would watch videos, have discussions, and get prepared to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation. We did a series of videos called *Chosen*, which dove deep on why being a disciple of *Christ* and proclaiming the Gospel is so important. Along with the videos, we would stop them at certain points and have a group discussion, or even small discussions with table partners. We also wrote answers to questions there had been about the video, one including, what we hoped to get out of Confirmation. I think this question was very important for us 8th graders, especially going to high school next year: it made us take a step back to really reflect on our relationship with God.

Through our experience, we have all learned a lot. What it means to be a disciple of God, why proclaiming the Gospel is important, why Confirmation is important, and what it truly means to be an adult of the Catholic Church. At this time, I would like to say thank you to Mrs. LoPiparo, the 7th grade homeroom teacher and our Religion teacher, as well as the whole staff of Corpus Christi, and everyone who attends the school. 
